Hard light is rarely used to photograph women. Why do you think this is?

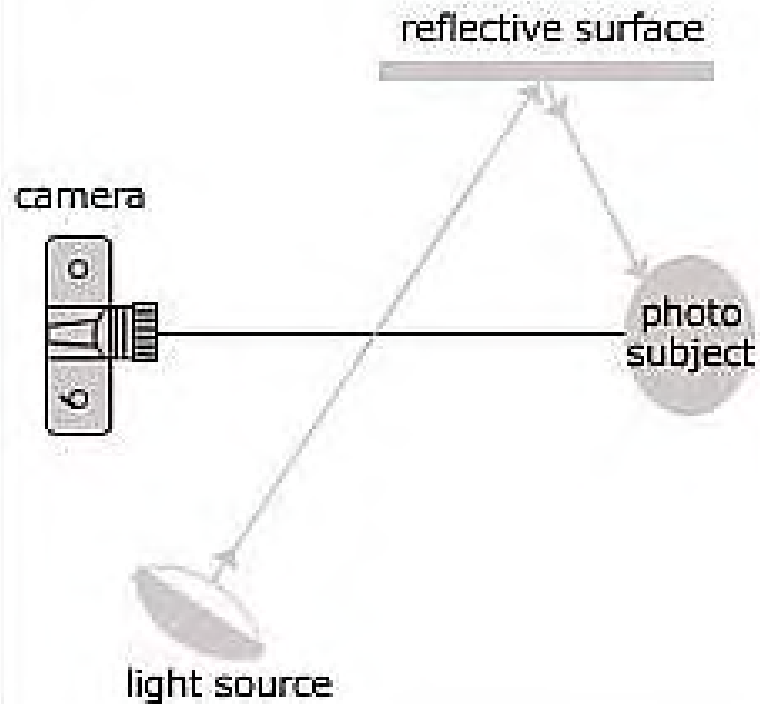
Soft Light

Bounce Lighting

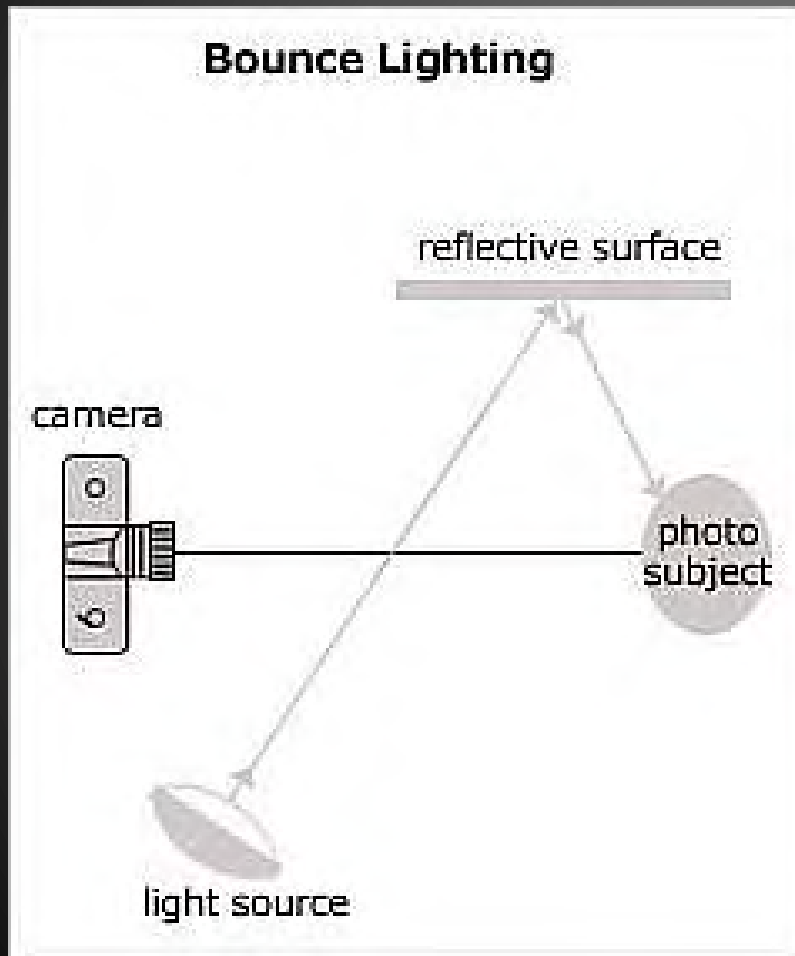


Bounced lighting
